

ALL RESIDENTS NEED TO KEEP THEIR CARS LOCKED, TO HELP AVOID BREAKINS.

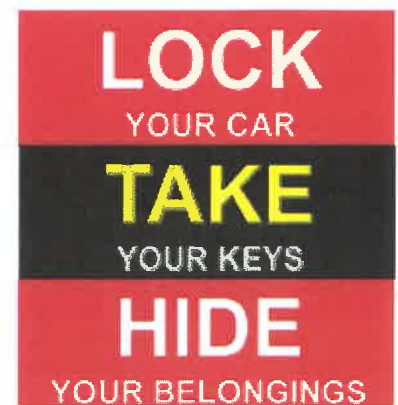
Leaving valuables in sight in your car and car doors unlocked makes it very easy for someone to take your valuables, cash, key fobs, electronics etc.

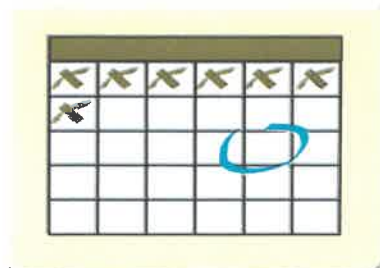
BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETS THE THIRD THURSDAY OF EACH MONTH AT 7PM

NEW CHILD SAFETY SEAT LAW—EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2019

(Community Service Article - AAA Tidewater Virginia's Traffic Safety Office)

Virginia law requires children to remain rear-facing in their child safety seats until age 2 or until the child reaches the minimum weight limit for a forward facing child restraint as prescribed by the restraint's manufacturer.

This change aligns Virginia with the safety recommendations of organizations such as the American Academy of Pediatrics, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Rear-facing seats limit the motion of the child's head, reducing the potential for neck injury, and disperse the crash force more evenly across the back of the seat and the child's body. Children are about 75 percent less likely to die or be seriously injured in a crash when secured in a rear-facing child restraint.

When weighing a move from rear-facing to forward-facing seats after the child reaches age 2, parents should consider the manufacturer's maximum weight and height limitations of the rear-facing child restraint and continue using the rear-facing position until those limits are reached.

Waste-Free Yards Keeps Pets Healthy

American pet owners collectively spend tens of millions of dollars every year on veterinary care and over-the-counter medicines for their furry loved ones. But what many don't realize is that many pet illnesses can be avoided by simply keeping the back yard clear of pet waste.

Dog waste is more than just a smelly and unsightly mess. It's also a breeding ground for infection—especially in dog parks and other areas where dogs frequently gather. Bacteria, worms and other parasites thrive in the waste until it's cleaned up or washed into the water supply. Giardia, ringworm, roundworm and E. coli are examples of such inhabitants, all of which are commonly found in dog feces and are easily transferable upon contact.

When pets become sick, contagions are often times passed through their deposits into their own yard. The longer infected dog waste stays on the ground, the greater a contamination becomes. And when this waste is not picked up, pets have a high risk of catching the infection over and over again.

Roundworm, for example, is one of the most common parasites found in dog waste and it can remain infectious in contaminated soil and water for years.

The best thing pet owners can do to help keep their four-legged friends healthy and safe is to pick up after them and to do so in a timely manner. Those who don't have enough time to deal with the mess themselves—or simply don't want to—should consider hiring a local pet waste removal service.

When walking your fur baby, please remember to clean up the dog waste, and dispose of it properly. Trash cans are located throughout the community, and in the park areas. We all thank you for being considerate of others!



It's Hurricane Season...Be Ready for Severe Weather - June 1- Nov. 30

Sun, surf and sand.... Living in a coastal community is like being on vacation every day, but it also has its occasional hurricanes, nor'easters and tropical storms. Don't wait to prepare and protect your home and your family. Make a plan, get a kit, stay informed, know your risk, know your evacuation zone and know your evacuation route. Here are important tips to ensure your safety before, during and after severe weather:

Make a plan:

- Have a family emergency plan. Talk to your children. Everyone should know what to do in case family members are not together when severe weather happens.
- Make sure you have a safe place to go when severe thunderstorm or tornado warnings are issued. Safe areas include basements and interior rooms such as bathrooms or closets on the lowest level of a sturdy building. Stay away from windows. If outside, don't seek shelter under trees.
- Talk to your insurance agent about low-cost flood insurance policy options or go to www.floodsmart.gov.
- Know your [evacuation zone](#) and [evacuation route](#) in case you are to be advised to leave the area.

Get a kit:

- Keep [emergency supplies](#) on hand, including at least three days' nonperishable food and water, flashlights and batteries, first aid kit and medicines. Make a customized individual kit for babies, family members with functional or special needs, seniors, pets, and one to keep in each of your vehicles.

Stay Informed:

- Register to receive emergency text messages, email alerts and warnings on your mobile devices at [VBAAlert](#).
- Logon to the city's website, www.VBgov.com, for the latest news and information.
- Monitor local news radio stations.
- Tune in to local television stations: WTKR TV-3, WAVY TV-10 and WVEC TV13.
- The city's VBTv channels: Cox Cable 46, 47 & 48 and Verizon cable 45, 46 & 47 will display emergency information including city operational status and facilities closure notices.
- Follow the city's social media sites: www.facebook.com/cityofvabeach and www.twitter.com/cityofvabeach.
- Contact Citizen Services: 311 or 385-3111 will provide current operating conditions and facility closures; do not call 911 unless you have an emergency.
- Get the latest weather information from the National Weather Service at www.weather.gov.
- Purchase an NOAA Weather Radio or battery-powered/hand crank radio with an NOAA Weather Band to get weather warnings directly from the [National Weather Service](#).

Natural Ways To Keep Cool When It's Hot

Eat These: The following foods work to help your body regulate its temperature and keep you cooler: mushrooms, citrus fruit, lemon balm, and mint. Spicy foods can also help by causing you to sweat more. As the sweat evaporates, it cools you down. Snacking on frozen melon cubes or berries is also smart way to cool down.

Drink Up: Stay hydrated by sipping from a water bottle throughout the day. Aim for at least a half-gallon over the course of a day. If you sweat a lot, throw a sports drink or two into the mix to replace lost electrolytes. If you're tired of water, natural fruit juices are a good alternative (and make great frozen drinks, too, for additional cooling benefits). Add a few mint leaves for a super-cooling treat. Just avoid excess caffeine or alcohol, which can dehydrate you.

Make a Splash: Swimming is a great way to cool off on hot days. It works because, when we get wet, the water evaporates from our skin, taking heat with it. If you can't get to a pool or swimming hole, you can achieve this same result with a shower or bath, or just by wetting your hair. Soaking your feet or even just running cold water over each of your wrists for 10 seconds can also help.

Cool Your Neck: Your body's main temperature sensor is located on the back of your neck. If you have long hair, wear it up to let breezes reach this area. If you're going to sit by a fan, make sure it blows onto the back of your neck. A cool compress over this area will also go a long way to helping you feel cooler.

Get Low: Heat rises, and in homes with two or more stories, all of that heat hangs around and stagnates on the top floors. Make yourself more comfortable by the spending time on the lowest level of your home. Make yourself a little cool-off cave in the basement, if you have one. Buy a beanbag chair and chill out near the floor.

Make Yourself Minty Fresh: Rub on some peppermint lotion. The menthol will stimulate your nerves and trick your body into thinking you're cooler than you are.

Be as Cool as a Cucumber: Rub a slice of chilled cucumber over your face. The thick juice will take longer to evaporate than water, for extended refreshment.

Do Nothing: Just sit verrrry still. Don't try to run errands or do housework or anything else active during the hottest part of the day. These will raise your body temperature. Save these tasks for evening, when things start to cool down. Of course, doing nothing can be difficult. We recommend buying a sturdy hammock to help you achieve this goal.
